Course Description

The class is part of the UnCommon read series offered by the UF Honors Program and is centered around a single book, The Voyage of the Beagle, that describes Charles Darwin's five years journey around the world. Every week students will independently read two chapters of the book and answer few questions provided by the instructor that will serve as the foundation for class discussion. At the end of each class we will have a short graphic presentation prepared by students of sites that Darwin visited.

Course Objectives

By the end of the course you will be able to:

- 1. Identify the sites Darwin visited during his five years journey in the Beagle.
- 2. Discuss Darwin's observations and experiences and understand how these influenced his ideas.
- 3. Recognize the differences between past and modern scientific explorations.
- 4. Understand how exploration and traveling can influence our careers.
- 5. Develop and propose a natural history expedition of your interest.

Required Materials

Required book: The Voyage of the Beagle, The Floating Boat Press, ISBN 9781775413127. This version is an E-book available in the UF Library. There are other versions available; you could choose other versions as long as the follow the organization of the E-book chosen for the class (21 chapters). Other materials: You will need access to a computer with an internet connection to download the Voyage of the Beagle e-book and to access and download additional reading materials and software that will be made available on Canvas or freely available on the internet.

Course Requirements

1. **Weekly Readings:** Prior to each class, read the assigned chapter or chapters. Answer the guiding questions provided by the instructor. Please submit your answers to these questions via Canvas no later than Mondays before 1:00 p.m.

When reading take notes on phrases or ideas you don't understand or you would like to discuss during class, please share them during class.

2. Class Participation: The success of this class depends on your engagement and active participation. Participation will be evaluated by attendance, your active participation in discussions and presentations. Class participation is worth 50% of your final grade.
